## **2D: Chair's Report**

Chair Grenot-Scheyer shared her mixed feelings about the current climate and reviewed the April 2026 meeting agenda. She commended the crew of Artemis II, offering special recognition to pilot Victor Glover.

## **2E: Executive Director's Report**

Executive Director Mary Vixie Sandy thanked Commission staff Amarjot Biring, Anita Fitzhugh, Brendan Hu, Laura Hiller, and Nataly Kurylov for their work on transitioning the Commission's old website to a new site to better serve the education community and partners. Executive Director Sandy announced that the Commission launched a new Center for Educator Workforce Development with funding from the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation.

## **2F: Commission Member Reports**

Commissioner Browne provided an update on the latest initiatives, programs, and activities across the California Community Colleges and shared information about the upcoming California early childhood education state conferences.

Commissioner Pavri expressed her excitement about the \$110 million donation to three Los Angeles county universities- California State University (CSU), Los Angeles, University of California (UC), Los Angeles, and CSU, Dominguez Hills- by the Ballmer Group to shore up the region's youth mental and behavioral health workforce.

Commissioner Francois reported on her attendance at the 2026 American Educational Research Association Annual meeting in Los Angeles and shared information about the 2nd Annual California Early Wealth Account System Summit: *Building Economic Prosperity for Every Child* on April 17, 2026 at the University of California, Los Angeles.

Commissioner Torres presented updates, ongoing programs, and recent activities from the California Department of Education.

Commissioner Erickson reminded everyone about the continuous impact of ICE on families, children, and communities. She reported that the Association of Independent California Colleges and Universities (AICCU) prepared the highest percentage of teachers in California and shared information about the California Council on Teacher Education 2026 Spring Policy Action Network Conference in March 2026 and the International Christian Community for Teacher Education (ICCTE) Conference in May 2026 at Point Loma Nazarene University. Lastly, she notified the public that she will be retiring from the School of Education at Point Loma Nazarene University but will continue as the ex-officio representative for the AICCU.

Commissioner Redfern reported on her attendance at a workshop about the impacts of Artificial Intelligence on both the Teacher Performance Assessment (TPA) and Administrator Performance Assessment on March 6, 2026 which Commissioner Uzoff also attended and commended Commission staff for bringing the Commission and the California Department of Education together on this effort.

### **3A: Student Teacher Stipend Program: Implementation Overview and Related Statewide Initiatives**

### **3B: Design Specifications for a Commission Model Teaching Performance Assessment**

Adam Ebrahim, Chief Deputy Director; and Juliet Wahleithner, Director, Division of Research, Evaluation, and Assessment, presented this item which presented draft design specifications for a Commission model Teaching Performance Assessment for Commission feedback to inform continued refinement of the specifications; expert and panel engagement; research and structured information gathering, including a request for information; and subsequent development of a recommended performance assessment development pathway.

### **Commission Action**

Commissioner de la Torre moved to affirm the draft design specifications and directed staff to continue refinement through expert and panel engagement; research and structured information gathering, including a Request for Information; and the subsequent development of a recommended performance assessment development pathway. Commissioner Redfern seconded the motion. The motion carried without dissent.

### **3D: AB 1119 Implementation Plan: Dual Credentialing**

Erin Sullivan, Director; William Hatrick and Michelle Fennell, Consultants, Division of Standards, Accreditation, and Workforce Investment, presented this item which provided an update on implementation of Assembly Bill 1119 (Patel), which requires the Commission, by March 1, 2027, with input from the education field, to develop and establish efficient routes to dual credentialing across general education and special education. This item provided background and statutory context, described the approach staff are using to carry out this work, and presented the work plan, engagement structure, and anticipated next phases aligned to the statutory timeline.

**Yolanda Munoz, California Teachers Association**, spoke in support of AB 1119 and requested CTA's participation in the one-on-one interviews, small group discussions, and field surveys currently planned, as well as other opportunities to engage and support this work.

**Brianna Bruns, California County Superintendents**, submitted a written comment which applauded the Commission's transparent, phased approach to implementing AB 1119.

**Sarah Lillis, Teach Plus California**, submitted a written comment in support of AB 1119 and expressed her appreciation to the Commission for its thoughtful approach to ensuring that implementation of AB 1119 moves the state forward in establishing a pathway for dual credentials.

### **3C: Actions To Support Candidates in Demonstrating Subject Matter Competence**

Juliet Wahleithner, Director, Division of Research, Evaluation, and Assessment, presented this item which provided an update on the Plan to Improve Options for Meeting the Subject Matter Requirements for Teaching Credentials, approved by the Commission in October 2025. The item included the results of a survey administered to educator preparation programs to learn about

their processes and challenges with evaluating transcripts for subject matter competencies and identified steps that have been taken to address the most commonly cited challenges, including draft condensed versions of Subject Matter Requirement domains for the Commission's review and possible approval.

**Kristina McCormick, Riverside County Office of Education**, thanked the Commission, the Commission staff, and everyone involved in this work and voiced her support for the work to condense and clarify the domains which will improve consistency, efficiency, and fairness across programs. She further underscored the support for sending the condensed domain descriptions out to educator preparation programs for review and wished to see more of the recommendations incorporated into practice in the future.

#### **Commission Action**

Commissioner Mancillas moved to direct staff to circulate the draft condensed subject matter domain descriptions with educator preparation programs for feedback and bring the final set of condensed Subject Matter Requirement domain descriptions to the Commission for review and potential approval in June. Commissioner Simmons seconded the motion. The motion carried with Commissioner Uzoff abstaining.

#### **3E: Initial Institutional Approval – Stage III: Consideration of Provisional Approval for Reach University**

Frances Kellar, Consultant, Division of Standards, Accreditation, and Workforce Investment, presented this item which provided, as part of the Initial Institutional Approval process, Reach University's responses to the Common Standards for consideration and possible Provisional Approval by the Commission.

#### **5A: Teacher Supply in California, 2023-24 A Report to the Legislature**

Erin Skubal, Senior Director, Licensing Branch; Kristin Calderone, Interim Administrator, and Phi Phi Lau, Research Data Specialist, Division of Research, Evaluation, and Assessment, presented this item which provided a report to the Governor and the Legislature on the number of teachers who received credentials, certificates, permits and waivers to teach in California public schools. In addition to the written Teacher Supply report, information on the educator supply dashboards was updated with the most recent data.

**Kai Mathews, Public Advocates/LCFF Equity Coalition-John Affeldt, Public Advocates/Natalie Wheatfall-Lum, EdTrust-West/Martha Hernández, Californians Together/Jessica Sawko, Children Now/Sarah Lills, Teach Plus California/Steven Almazán, EdVoice Institute**, spoke on this item and submitted a letter which acknowledged the state for its investments in educator workforce and expressed appreciation of the decline in emergency permits and waivers. She suggested the state collect retention data at the school and district level and urged the Commission to expand the data to include trends in bilingual teacher preparation and authorization.

#### **5B: Assignment Monitoring Sanction Program Decision Points**

Erin Henderson, Deputy Director, Ann Harris, Assignment Monitoring Program Manager, and Gianna Barlupi, Assignment Monitoring Analyst, Division of Licensure Certification, presented this item which provided the Commission with a summary of feedback received from local education agency (LEA) partners related to identifying appropriate calculation methods and

thresholds for sanctions for assignment monitoring and offered various options for the Commission to consider for identifying LEAs subject to sanctions.
